

Did you know...



For babies and toddlers talking about and playing with shapes is the first stage of recognizing letters.

Babies and toddlers are trying to make sense of their world and one way they do this is to look, taste, listen to, and feel objects. This helps them sort the objects into categories, such as round objects/soft objects; and to tell one object from another, such as a blanket from a ball. Once they are toddlers they can begin learning about shapes and colors.

Children that recognize shapes and are able to tell the difference between them have an easier time learning about letters.


Level 1

Here's how...




- ✦ Read shape books together. There are a wide variety of shape board books to interest your child.
- ✦ Go on a scavenger hunt to look for shapes around the house or in the community. Take a box or bag and collect round things, long things, blue things, etc.
- ✦ Point out shapes in familiar objects. "Your sandwich is a square shape. See, it has four straight sides, 1-2-3-4."





Do You See Shapes? by Scholastic





Make a touch book... Cut cardboard into same sized pieces. Put three holes in the pieces on the left side. Tie pieces together with yarn or string. Put one thing your baby or toddler likes on each page (keys, ribbon, spoon, a leaf). Talk about the things while your child touches them. "This is a shiny spoon; this is a soft, pink ribbon."

Cut shapes from clean kitchen sponges and let your little one play with them while she takes a bath. Make soap prints with the sponges on the sides of the tub.

A Ball for Baby

Caregiver does motions with baby on lap; toddlers can do motions on their own or with doll

Here's a ball for baby, *(hands make circle shape)*
Big and soft and round.

Here is baby's music, clapping clapping so.
(clap hands)

Here are baby's soldiers, *(hold fingers upright)*

Here's the way that baby plays at peek-a-boo.
(peek-a-boo)

Here's a big umbrella *(hands together over head)*
To keep a baby dry.


Here is baby's cradle *(put arms around baby)*
