
Here are some types of books that will help your preschooler develop important skills that will help him learn to read later on:

Tips for Reading Aloud

- Choose books that you enjoy reading aloud.
- Ask questions about the books you read together. Have your child predict what might happen next.
- Try having a regular storytime, maybe at bedtime. This can be a peaceful few minutes for the whole family.
- Make reading fun by changing your voice for different parts. Use a deep voice for Papa Bear and a high voice for Baby Bear.



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
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
