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Call for Student Entries: Letters About Literature Contest

BOISE, ID – The Idaho Commission for Libraries is pleased to announce the 2015 Letters About Literature (LAL) writing competition. Letters About Literature is a national program of the Library of Congress Center for the Book. The contest challenges readers in grades 4–12 to write a personal letter to an author explaining how that author’s work changed the reader’s view of the world. “By encouraging personal reader response and reflexive writing, LAL encourages meaningful reading and helps to create successful writers,” said Pam Bradshaw, program supervisor at the Commission. “The Commission is proud to continue our sponsorship of this learning opportunity for Idaho students.”

Letters About Literature awards prizes at both the state and national level in three competition levels: Level 1 for students in grades 4 – 6; Level 2 for students in grades 7 and 8; and Level 3 for students in grades 9 – 12. State winners receive a cash award of \$100 and national winners receive a cash award of \$1,000.

Level 3: December 15, 2014 (postmarked)

Levels 1 and 2: January 15, 2015 (postmarked)

State winners will be notified in April 2015 and national winners in May 2015.
