Digital Roundup: Where Are They Now?

Over the last two years, Talking Book Service (TBS) staff and Idaho Commission for Libraries (ICfL) volunteers have been converting titles in the locally recorded book collection from cassette to cartridge format. It is a time-consuming process, and we are fortunate to have so many dedicated volunteers. At first the titles were only circulated on cartridges. Last year we added the ability to also download locally recorded books.

To identify and download locally recorded books:

1. Log in to the Idaho Talking Book online catalog at <http://webopac.klas.com/idbph>. Contact TBS to request a login and password at 800-458-3271.
2. Search the catalog by author, title, or subject.
3. You can limit your search to downloadable books. Under "Search Options," go to "Media" and select "Digital Book." Click "Submit Search."

4. All titles listed on the Search Results page are available to download. Click on the Title field of any title for the full record.
5. Click on the link in the "Click on Link to Download" field to begin the download process. Note: If the book is available in BARD, you will need to log in to BARD.

Recently recorded titles are promoted in each newsletter. In this issue, the Book Order Form in the middle lists some of the titles that have been converted to cartridges, and future newsletters will continue to do so. Remember, these are older titles you may have read that are now available on cartridge. You can request these titles by checking those you want to read and returning the order form to TBS, or by using the search instructions above to download. All titles in the locally recorded collection should be available on cartridge and for download by 2014.

Reader Resources

TumbleBooks are Here!

Whether you're a child, or just young at heart, check out the TumbleBookLibrary, a new electronic resource available for all Idahoans at public libraries throughout the state. All you need is a computer and access to the Internet to read these titles yourself, or with a child.

TumbleBookLibrary contains more than 300 animated, talking picture books, which help kids read in a format they'll love. TumbleBooks are created by adding animation, sound, music, and narration to existing picture books in order to produce an electronic picture book that you can read, or have read to you. The collection contains titles from children's book publishers such as Simon & Schuster, Chronicle Books, Candlewick Press, Charlesbridge Press, Walker & Company Annick Press, Orca Books, Lerner Books, and HarperCollins Publishers, among others.

TumbleBooks will be available in Idaho's public libraries by early December through a "Routes to Reading" grant to the Idaho

Commission for Libraries from the Institute of Museum and Library Services. Just go to your local public library's website and look for TumbleBooks. Call the Talking Book Service at 800-458-3271 to identify your closest public library's website.

What Are You Reading? by Mary Ellen Halverson

Reading—Come Rain or Shine

We all know the slogan, "Reading Is for Everyone," and I believe reading is for any time too—on a rainy or snowy day, on a sunny spring day, or even on a hot summer day.

Recently I read *Snowfire*, by Phyllis Whitney, written in 1972. I was curious about the author's life, so I did a little research and discovered that Phyllis Whitney lived from 1903-2008, and was 104 years old when she died. She wrote most of her books from the 1960s into the 1990s. She was born in Japan and lived in several countries around the world. She preferred to call her novels romance/suspense books.

Snowfire, was recently added to the BARD list of books to download, and is also available on cartridge. This was one of her books I had not read in the past, so I downloaded it and thoroughly enjoyed it. It takes place at a ski resort lodge in the east, but could have easily been located in the mountains of Idaho. The heroine's brother, a well known skier, has been accused of murder, so his sister Linda applies for a job at the ski lodge to do some investigating.

The nearby old mansion in the woods, Graystones, which is complete with a stone tower, a

dusty spooky attic, and a view of stark blackened trees from a fire, is the scene of many of the chapters of this intriguing book. Residents of the mansion include a famous skier whose wife was murdered, his 8-year-old emotionally disturbed daughter, and his sister who "floats" around the mansion and adds the mystical touch that Phyllis seemed to enjoy in many of her books. The sister's cat also appears to have some supernatural characteristics, and adds a fun touch to the story.

There are exciting scenes on the ski slopes especially near the end of the book that will not let you put the book down to cook dinner or do the laundry. Although the author gives us clues throughout the book, some of which are misleading, I did not solve the mystery. Perhaps you will be a better detective than I was.

The characters come to life and take over parts of your day, your thoughts, and your time! I believe that Phyllis Whitney's wonderful skill and talent as a storyteller are vividly evident in this book, and I would recommend that you read some of her other novels. There are several listed in BARD and on cartridge.

Frequently Asked Questions

Below are answers to questions we are asked about the cassette players, books, and magazines:

- 1. I am no longer using my cassette player. Can I give it to my friend?**
No. All equipment that is loaned as part of the Talking Book Service is federal property and must be returned to the Talking Book Service when you are done using it—regardless of its condition or possible future use. This includes players, headphones, and other accessories.
- 2. I liked the easy player. Why can't I have another one?**
E-1 easy players were in limited supply and have not been maintained. Digital players work similar to an easy player, provide much better sound quality, and are readily available. Try it—you'll like it.
- 3. When will all the older cassette books be available on cartridges?**
The National Library Service is working on converting the entire collection to cartridges, but it will take several years. Books containing outdated information, such as medical and computer books, will not be converted. Volunteers are converting locally recorded Idaho Talking Books and hope to have all titles available on cartridges by 2014.
- 4. When will magazines be available on cartridges?**
Magazines are scheduled to be available on cartridges sometime in 2013. Users will receive all magazine titles they subscribe to on one cartridge and must return the cartridge in order to receive future magazine cartridges.
- 5. I heard cassette books will no longer be available. When will that happen?**
The National Library Service has instructed the Idaho Talking Book Service to reduce its inventory of cassette books over the next two years. At some point after that, cassette books may no longer be available. All users are encouraged to request a digital player and enjoy its ease of use and high-quality sound.



Colette and Cindy usually cap their weekly volunteer sessions with coffee or lunch, and often get together with their husbands to play cards. They also formed a book club that includes six other readers. Colette enjoys a good story, fiction or non-fiction, and Cindy likes reading novels and books about other cultures.

Both volunteers look forward to the part of their week when they volunteer at the Commission. They are impressed with the programs the Commission provides and they

enjoy providing education and entertainment for people unable to read regular print. It’s an added bonus that their reading partner is also a friend.

In her spare time, Colette volunteers for other organizations and enjoys a variety of activities, such as spending time with her children and grandchildren, gardening, tap dancing, snowshoeing, hiking, aerobics, and motorcycle riding with her husband. Cindy enjoys knitting, reading, quilting, and hiking, and is becoming adept at fishing with her husband in the Florida Keys.
