Thursday, August 20th is TBS Awareness Day—an opportunity to raise the general public's awareness of this service that gives those unable to read standard print access to popular books and magazines. Public libraries throughout the state are recognizing the event with activities that share information about the Talking Book Service and highlight resources available in the local public library that are usable by those requiring print alternatives.

Reading Alternative: Washington Audio Books

Many users enjoy reading locally recorded books: titles that NLS does not record due to time and cost constraints. Often these titles focus on local history, topics, or people.

Unfortunately, locally recorded titles are not currently available on the BARD site. However, Washington Talking Book and Braille Library in Seattle (WTBBL) is making its locally recorded titles available for download from its website to all Talking Book Service users. Currently about 60 titles are available.

Before accessing the site or downloading titles, users must contact WTBBL at 800-542-0866 and request a user name and password. Staff will ask which talking book service the user is enrolled in and then contact Idaho TBS to confirm.

A user name and password will be issued to the user after confirming the user is registered in Idaho TBS. Users can then access the site and download titles to be read with the NLS digital player or any of the four commercial players currently able to play NLS digital books.

To successfully use this resource, users must have high speed Internet access and be comfortable with the following:

- searching a database
- downloading files to their computers
- locating and unzipping files
- copying files to a memory chip

Magazine Corner

Recent changes to three magazines:

Cassette magazines:

US News and World Report weekly has changed their publication schedule to monthly. It will no longer be available on audio tape. Anyone signed up for this will automatically receive instead *The Week*, a news and current event magazine.

For Braille readers:

- *Washington Post Book World* is being incorporated into the *Washington Post* and it will be replaced with *The New York Times Book Review* weekly.
- *Parenting Magazine* has recently begun publishing as two separate magazines—*Parenting: Early Years* and *Parenting: School Years*. Subscribers to *Parenting* will receive both magazines automatically, in Braille.

The park, and indeed the West, was shaped by a colorful cast of characters, from railroad barons to explorers and naturalists.

School Resources

The new school year is fast approaching, and for many TBS users finding readable materials is a challenge. Start the year out right by checking out the following resources:

Recording for the Blind and Dyslexic (RFB&D): RFB&D records textbooks and educational support materials in all subjects for students from kindergarten to graduate school. Their large collection is available in CD-ROM format, plus many titles are available to download. A membership fee and special playback equipment are required, but many schools are institutional members and provide materials to their students. Eligibility requirements apply. TBS staff can certify TBS users are eligible to use RFB&D. For more information, go to www.rfbd.org or call 800-221-4792.

Bookshare: A volunteer organization whose mission is to ensure that all individuals with print disabilities have equal and timely access to print materials. Under a federal grant, all students have free access to their database of scanned textbooks, magazines, and educational materials. Downloaded titles can be accessed as audio books or in electronic Braille. All TBS users are eligible to use Bookshare. For more information visit bookshare.org or call 650-644-3400.

Talking Book Service (TBS): The TBS collection contains many titles useful to students, such as children's books and books discussed in literature classes or listed in bibliographies. Titles are also available in several languages for those studying foreign languages. The website (<http://libraries.idaho.gov/page/collections>) has a link to Kids Zone, a website which focuses on resources for students from preschool to grade 8. All highlighted resources are available via TBS. Increasing numbers of TBS titles are also available for download at Braille and Audio Reading Download (BARD). Currently, approximately 15,000 titles can be downloaded onto NLS compatible players. Contact TBS to be placed on a waiting list for a NLS digital player. Distribution begins in September.

School and public libraries: Many local libraries have resources such as large print books, audio books, and downloadable books. All publicly funded libraries in Idaho have access to the LiLI databases, electronic databases for students at all levels. Go to the LiLI portal (<http://libraries.idaho.gov/page/lili-databases>) for more information on accessing these resources from any computer, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, or check with your local library for information on the resources they have available.

Using these resources can help students stay at the head of the class!



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
