Magazine Corner

Effective January 2015, the Idaho Talking Book Service will no longer distribute magazines on cassette. As issues become available, magazines you are subscribed to will be sent on cartridge. All magazines on cartridges must be returned in order to receive the next issue. Repeated failure to return the cartridges in a timely way could result in cancellation of that magazine title.

Cassette players are federal property and must be returned to the Talking Book Service when no longer in use. If you have kept your cassette player solely to listen to locally distributed magazines, you may return it to the Talking Book Service free postage for the blind and physically handicapped. If you need a box to return it, please contact the Talking Book Service at 800.458.3271 or 334.2150, and we will send you one.

Idaho Books Go National!

Talking Book Service (TBS) staff continues to make locally recorded books available for download from BARD, the national database for downloading audio and Braille books and magazines. Talking Book users throughout the nation can also download Idaho's books from BARD, and they seem to be very popular. Fifteen Idaho titles have been uploaded since July, and they have been downloaded a total of 446 times! Staff and volunteers are proud to be able to share information about Idaho and by Idaho authors with readers throughout the United States.

To identify books about Idaho or by an Idaho author that have been recorded in Idaho's TBS studios, enter the terms "DBC" and "Idaho" in the "search the collection" search box. DBC is the prefix for locally recorded books. The number of Idaho books available for download will increase as additional titles are uploaded.

You can download books and magazines from BARD if you have a computer and high-speed Internet access, or a family member or friend can download them for you. Contact the TBS at 800.458.3271 for more information.

Volunteer Highlight—Mark Watt

About three-and-a-half years ago, Mark Watt began volunteering at the Idaho Commission for Libraries after hearing about an opportunity to help with the Talking Book Service (TBS). A TBS user himself, Mark jumped at the chance to give back to a program that has offered him so much reading enjoyment.

Mark started by working on anything that needed to be done, and often helped with collection maintenance by keeping the cassettes in good repair. A year or so ago, a fellow volunteer asked if Mark could help with the digital players, and since then he has been preparing new and refurbished players for circulation. He reprograms and recharges them, and makes sure they include all instructions and registration information.

Volunteering not only provides Mark with the opportunity to give back, but also to help other volunteers when they need it. He says that Volunteer Coordinator Sheila Winther is great to work for and she makes sure that the volunteers are matched with their interests and abilities. Sheila says, "Mark is such an asset to our volunteer program. The digital machines take a lot more time to maintain than we anticipated, and

since Mark took over that position, we never have to worry about not having enough machines ready to circulate. He is also quick to ask, "What else can I help with?" and I hardly ever turn down the offer!"

In his spare time, Mark works out and does other activities to stay healthy. He also enjoys reading, especially books of a political and historical nature. He used to work for a defense and security intelligence analysis company, and still believes that staying abreast of current events, whether they have a direct impact or not, is very important. As someone who has lived in both San Francisco and Washington, D.C., as well as Idaho, he also says that a person doesn't realize how big our country is until they've lived on both sides.

New Process to Request a Currency Reader

As of January 2, 2015, the Bureau of Engraving and Printing (BEP) Currency Reader project is open to all citizens and legal residents of the United States who are unable to read regular print as a result of blindness or a visual impairment.

At this time the process for requesting that currency reader has changed. Employees of the Talking Book Service (TBS) will no longer be able to request a currency reader for our patrons. Instead, individuals have to complete a printed copy of the application and mail it to BEP.

There are three ways to obtain a copy of the application:

- Call TBS at 800.458.3271 and request a printed copy of the application.
- Download a copy from BEP at www.moneyfactory.gov/uscurrencyreaderform.html.

- Download a copy from the NLS website at loc.gov/nls/pdf/application.pdf.

Individuals who are already patrons of the Talking Book Service do not need to have the application certified but must check the box on the application to indicate that they are a current NLS patron. Individuals who are not NLS patrons (NOT members of the Talking Book Service) must have the BEP application certified. Instructions on how to obtain certification are included on the form.

Are you having technical difficulties with your currency reader? The first step is to call the Bureau of Engraving and Printing. Their Call Center may be reached at 844.815.9388. They are open Monday—Friday, 6:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. MST.

March 4 is Idaho Day

What Are You Reading?

Maryan Stephens, a Boise native who lived on both coasts in the 30 years she was away from the area, has narrated books for the Idaho Talking Book Service since her return in 1992. She estimates that she has recorded 125 books in 21 years. She and co-worker/monitor, Ruby Weaver, just started book number 126. Together this "dangerous duo" has been producing a quality end-product for 10 years.

The book I wish to enthusiastically recommend is a novel published in May 2014 by Boise resident and prominent member of our literary and arts community, Anthony Doerr. *All the Light We Cannot See* is Doerr's second novel. He has also written and published two volumes of short stories and a memoir.

Anthony Doerr, a Cleveland, Ohio, native, has experienced a good part of the United States as well as places such as New Zealand, France, Italy, and Germany. His education, travels, and wide variety of jobs all inform his work. He has been the recipient of numerous literary awards and honors. Since publication of *All the Light We Cannot See*, sales have been brisk, placing the novel

on the Best Seller list for over 30 weeks. It was also a finalist for the National Book Awards and has been optioned for film.

Adults and teenagers are reading this book. In my opinion, it would make a great "read-aloud" for the entire family.

Having spent 10 years writing *All the Light We Cannot See*, Doerr expertly weaves together two parallel stories during World War II. One follows Marie, a blind French girl with a rich imaginary life who flees Paris with her father, a museum locksmith who is hiding a diamond from Nazi looters. The second story revolves around Werner, a German orphan whose brilliant mind has brought him to the attention of the Nazis.

The story unfolds in short chapters that switch between the two young characters' perspectives. The title, *All the Light We Cannot See*, is a metaphor as well as a reference to the development of the radio, which plays a part in the story...a story that carries us through the war years up to the present in a page-turning frenzy.
