Division Description

The Idaho Commission for Libraries (ICfL) assists in statewide library development, and provides continuing education and consultant services to the library community. Idaho's library community consists of 144 public library buildings that are open year-round, evenings, and weekends, as well as school and academic libraries. ICfL also coordinates various statewide programs, administers grants, advocates for library services, and facilitates planning for library development. Their statutory authority is found in §33-2501, Idaho Code.

The Idaho Commission for Libraries is governed by the Board of Library Commissioners and organized within the Department of Self-Governing Agencies. Prior to July 1, 2009, the commission was organized within the State Board of Education. The state librarian is appointed by the Board of Library Commissioners and serves as the commission's chief executive officer. The state librarian is charged with implementing the board's policies and rules, and with managing the operations of the commission. The commission has office locations in Boise, Moscow and Idaho Falls.

Inflationary Adjustments

The commission requests \$6,100 in general inflation for online computer services that support local Idaho communities through the libraries. The commission also requests \$5,500 in general inflation for the Learning Express Library collection of online courses that support career development and various certifications. Additionally, they request \$1,200 from the General Fund for contract inflation for the Libraries Linking Idaho databases (LiLI-D), which provide a wide range of online resources for libraries statewide.

Replacement Items

The commission requests \$23,200 to replace an SUV that was purchased in 2009 and has 105,000 miles on it. It typically travels over 20,000 per year and will have over 125,000 on it by the end of FY 2016.

The commission also requests \$40,000 for a network switch that is ten years old. The current switch does not support VOIP phones nor does it support any other network infrastructure improvements. The switch is the backbone for the commission's existing network and is a critical piece of their IT system.

They also request \$50,000 for a new phone system. The existing system is more than ten years old and is no longer compatible with the Capitol Mall phone system that uses a VOIP technology. The network switch must be replaced before the new phone system could be installed.

1. STEM Initiative Personnel

The commission requests \$108,700 in personnel costs and \$75,000 in ongoing operating expenditures from the General Fund, plus 1.25 FTP, to coordinate and oversee implementation of hands-on science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) programming in Idaho libraries across the state. The commission began incorporating STEM content in its programming for libraries in 2008, and are now in year three of rolling out the "Make It at the Library" initiative, which is largely STEM-based. The commission's staff has done the research, development, piloting, and evaluation of the "Make It" initiative, and has provided extensive staff training so local participating library staff can customize and implement activities for their own communities. The commission believes its "Make It" initiative has been highly successful, attracting new audiences to public libraries and receiving national recognition from over a dozen entities, including the Association of Small & Rural Libraries, the Institute of Museum & Library Services, and the National Maker Faire, as an efficient and effective state approach to providing STEM experiences. While the commission initially focused on programming for teens, participating librarians report that entire families are coming to create together and local residents are volunteering to share their specific expertise with their community. With this growing success, the commission cannot meet the current or projected demand. The state's 144 public libraries -- open year-round, evenings, and weekends -- are well-placed to provide STEM programming at the local level for preschoolers, students during their out-of-school time, and adults in need of new skills, however, most are unable to design, provide, and sustain such programs on their own. The new funding will enable the commission to promote hands-on STEM activities for all ages through best practices in libraries; align library-based out-of-school learning opportunities with Idaho's K-Career education and workforce development initiatives; support quality out-of-school STEM learning opportunities to help ensure every Idaho student is college and career ready; and participate in state and national STEM networks and collaborate with other agencies and organizations in STEM program development. Currently, there are 0.80 FTP dedicated to this task (0.39 federally funded FTP at \$26,700 and 0.41 state funded FTP at \$25,000). There is also a library consultant and an office specialist partially committed to the STEM initiative that total 0.41 FTP, plus \$77,800 in operating expenditures. If funded, the new FTP will lead the STEM team and focus on evaluating emerging technologies to incorporate into the initiative; identifying providers and trainers; identifying specific under-served audiences and their support groups; program evaluation; and communicating/collaborating with the STEM Action Center, the Idaho After School Network, and other Kcareer education and workforce development initiatives. An office specialist will also be added to the commission's staff. This positon would be filled by an existing 0.75 FTP and the remainder FTP is in this request. According to the commission, this initiative will serve Idahoans of all ages, including young learners, K-12 students, adults and entrepreneurs across the state.
