This board book describes the noises that tools make and shows how they are used to build a surprise by the end of the book.




Tip Tip Dig Dig, by Emma Garcia

This board book is a fun way to introduce children to the letters of the alphabet. There is a construction term to go with each letter, ending with Z for Zoooom!



My Big Truck Board, by Roger Priddy

# Songs and Fingerplays as Framework

Fingerplay:

# "Carpenter"

This is the way he measures the wood (make a measuring motion)

Measuring, measuring, measuring.

This is the way he saws the wood (make a sawing motion)

Sawing, sawing, sawing.

This is the way he nails the wood (make a hammering motion)

Nailing, nailing, nailing.

This is the way he paints the wood (make a painting motion)

Painting, painting, painting.

Song:

"What Shape is This?" (to the tune "Do You Know the Muffin Man?)

Do you know what shape this is,

What shape this is, what shape this is?



Do you know what shape this is,

I'm holding in my hand? (hold up a shape and have the child guess or tell them what it is)

### Action rhyme:

#### "Cranes"

Cranes reach up, (help your child reach their arms up)
Cranes reach down, (help your child reach their arms down)
Cranes reach out, (help your child reach their arms out)
And all around. (help your child turn around)

## Extension activities as Walls:

Trace shapes of blocks on paper and color them the same color as your block set.
 This creates a play mat to be used with blocks. It can be laminated, or taped to
 the floor. This can also be done on sheets or oilcloth with fabric markers or
 Sharpies. Put blocks out and encourage your child to place them on the matching
 shape.

- Put out big blocks made of cardboard or foam for children to build with. Another
  option would be wood blocks that are small enough for toddler hands, but big
  enough to not be a choking hazard. Toddlers love to make stacks and knock
  blocks down, so direct them to do this in a safe, fun way.
- Putting things in and taking things out teaches young children the concepts of in/out, empty/full, counting, and cleanup. Provide baskets or boxes that children can use with a collection of blocks or boxes.



• Some of the vehicles in books about construction are diggers and dumpers. Provide an area where toddlers can dig, scoop, and dump clean sand into containers, toy vehicles, or on a tablecloth.

# Crafts as Roofing:

- Provide a sturdy piece of paper, a plastic construction vehicle (small enough for your child to move), and chocolate pudding or brown paint. Have your child drive the truck through the pudding and then drive it over the paper to create a piece of art.
- Toddlers can create representations of buildings with colored paper cut into different sizes and colors, using a glue stick.
