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Children and Books

Children in early elementary school have a terrific sense of humor. They enjoy unlikely situations, stories about triumphs of others, and slapstick comedy.

Although boys' and girls' interests begin to differ at this age, it is important to provide both with a wide variety of choices.

Tips for Reading Aloud

- Do not stop reading when your child enters school. Even after children can read by themselves, they learn from hearing stories read aloud.
- Beginning readers like to hear books that are too hard for them to read alone, and they pick up new words and ideas.
- Make reading at home an enjoyable experience.
- Let children choose the books they want to read.
- Turn off the radio and TV while reading.

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
