The Idaho Talking Book Service is a free statewide program that loans Braille and audio books and magazines to anyone unable to read standard print due to a physical disability. The service is a partnership between the National Library Service in Washington, D.C., the Idaho Commission for Libraries, and the U.S. Postal Service, which receives an annual stipend that allows all materials to be delivered to eligible users as Free Matter for the Blind and Physically Handicapped.
