President Abraham Lincoln created the Idaho Territory on March 4, 1863. Idaho's state flower is the syringa. On July 3, 1890, Idaho was admitted as the 43rd state. In 1865, Boise replaced Lewiston as the territorial capital. Idaho's state seal is the only one in the United States created by a woman. Idaho's highest point is Borah Peak, at 12,662 feet. In 1992, the Monarch Butterfly was adopted as the state insect for Idaho. It is a great migrator that can travel many miles during its lifetime.
