Get Creative with Youth Art Month

March is Youth Art Month (YAM), a celebration of the visual arts that is currently promoted and organized by the Council for Art Education (CFAE). However, the Art & Creative Materials Institute (ACMI) actually started Children’s Art Month in 1961 to highlight the value of visual arts education for children. The annual celebration was expanded to include secondary school students in 1969 and officially changed to Youth Art Month. Fifteen years later, ACMI established the CFAE to advocate for visual art education and coordinate the YAM program at the national level.

The YAM theme for the 2023-24 school year is “Dream in Art.” While there are many active state chapters for Youth Art Month, unfortunately, no state program coordinators are listed for Idaho. That doesn’t mean you can’t implement fun activities and programs in your school or district throughout March! CFAE usually coordinates a flag design contest using the annual theme. Consider making a display of student art in a school common area, such as the library, and allowing students to vote on their favorite designs. Go beyond your school walls and create a district-wide contest, offering special prizes for the winner. Get inspired with this list: <https://www.weareteachers.com/display-student-work/>
