



# Where Would We Be Without Volunteers?

According to TeamStage.io, one in four Americans volunteers at least once each year. AmeriCorp says volunteer rates in Idaho are even higher at about 38% (that's top 10 in the USA) and about 19% of those volunteers donate their time to educational organizations. Some of those folks are bound to be in your school. Another interesting datapoint? 100% of all nonprofits rely on volunteers. Clearly, this source of unpaid labor is vital to the organizations volunteers support.

National Volunteer Week (April 21-27) is the perfect opportunity to celebrate those that show up to help stuff weekly folders, work with students who need a bit of extra time, shelve the books, keep score, organize fundraisers, supervise field trips, buy chocolate bars and wrapping paper, and more. Consider a few (mostly) free ideas to make your volunteers feel appreciated:

- A VIP parking spot or two for volunteers only.
- Dedicate a place in your school to special volunteers (an art corner, a bench, a bookshelf, etc.)
- Is your volunteer an alum? Or not? Gift them some school gear.
- Nametags that are a bit nicer and more official than the stickers they get when they sign in.
- Design a display honoring your school's volunteers on a prominent bulletin board, or a thank you message on the school's marque or website, or all three.
- Go old school and send a hand-written thank you card.
