

### **Library Congratulations!**

Congratulations to two Idaho libraries that recently received Institute for Museum and Library Services (IMLS) grant awards:

The **Shoshone-Bannock Tribes** received one IMLS grant:



The Native American Library Services Basic Grant (\$10,000) to "increase access to information and educational resources for children and adults through its new bookmobile. Native American newspapers, books, and magazines will be purchased to enhance the bookmobile collection and support access, education, cultural preservation, and community building throughout the reservation."

The **Nez Perce Tribe** received two IMLS grants:

- The Native American Library Services Basic Grant (\$9,800) to "purchase laptops, iPads, shelving, and office supplies to support patron checkout and public workstations at its new reading and research library, 'Hite'emenwees' (Place of Wisdom). ...The grant will support the first Tribal library for the Nez Perce Tribe."
- The Native American Library Services Enhancement Grant (\$108,000) "to support the library director position for their new 'Hite'emenwees' Nez Perce Tribe Reading and Research Library ... to expand outreach to the other two cities on the Nez Perce Reservation with the highest Native American populations ... adding collection materials ... and establishing monthly community programs in order to increase public interest and support for the library while fostering multicultural engagement and learning."

# **Idaho Teen Reading Challenge**

The second year of the Idaho Teen Reading Challenge will begin on October 1, and registration for this program is now open. To complete the challenge, tweens and teens choose eight titles from 10 categories to read from October through April. This year's categories are: Found While Browsing, Judge a Book by its Cover, One-Word Title, Read Before You Stream, Retelling of a Classic, Sci-Fi/Fantasy, True Story, YRCA Nominee, Your Favorite Genre, and Free Choice.



Here's how the program works:

- 1. The reading challenge will run from October 1 to April 30 (seven months). Teens will be challenged to read one book from eight different categories (eight books total) during that time. This year we are providing 10 categories to choose from, but teens only need to read from eight of the categories.
- 2. Register your library to participate in the program and request bookmarks, tracking forms, and reading journals.
- 3. After you receive program materials, you will give teens a form to keep track of their books. You can also hand out bookmarks and reading journals.
- 4. When a teen has completed the challenge, they can return their tracking sheet to your library. **New this year:** We will send you a custom vinyl sticker to hand out to teens when they finish the challenge. Also, each teen from your library to complete the challenge will earn you an entry into a drawing for free books for your library!
- 5. In May, the ICfL will send you a very short form to fill out. You will submit the total number of teens who completed the challenge at your library and some quick feedback about the program.

We will accept registrations through Friday, October 20, but register soon if you want to start the challenge at the beginning of October!

# **CLEL Early Learning Virtual Conference**

# **Kindergarten Gear-Up Program**

For those of you currently facilitating school readiness programs in the library, or if you have plans to launch a school readiness program, here is one model that could provide a template for your curriculum.

Kindergarten Gear Up is a kindergarten readiness program developed by the San Diego County Library to help both kids and caregivers prepare for kindergarten. It is targeted toward families whose children have not attended preschool.

Kindergarten Gear Up is a series of ten one-hour sessions that can be scheduled once a week for ten weeks, or twice a week for five weeks. There are separate activities for children and caregivers, so successful implementation requires two programming spaces and at least two to three staff members.

All the Kindergarten Gear Up content is freely available for any library to adapt into its programming. Content includes detailed lesson plans, a library of activities, booklists, caregiver handouts and discussion questions (in English and Spanish), posters, fliers, activity sheets, and more. Please note that this is a time-intensive program series. If you maintain a full program calendar, you will probably want to replace a current program rather than add Kindergarten Gear Up.

It's time to sign up and buy your questions for the 2023-2024 IBOB Season! There are enough question sets in a package to see any school through the inschool season.



# **Idaho Family Reading Week Registration Opens September 15**



Idaho Family Reading Week (FRW) is a statewide literacy-focused library program to encourage and inspire parents and caregivers to read with children. It is held each November, and this year's theme is "Art Is All Around Us." The ICfL will provide helpful resources, activity ideas, parent handouts, booklists, and wonderful art-related participant giveaways, including a copy of Peter Reynolds' *The Dot* for up to 10,000 children! Registered libraries will also receive

TinkerLab's Art Starts: 52 Projects for Open-Ended Exploration by Rachelle Doorley. Public, school, and tribal libraries can register for free participation in this program and offer literacy-focused FRW events in their community. Space is limited to the first 100 libraries to register. Though libraries that do not register in time won't receive the free books, they are welcome to use any of the program art, activity ideas, handouts, and online resources to host events.

# **Indigenous Idaho: Past, Future & Present Staff Training Course – Open!**



Learn about Idaho's federally recognized tribal nations. Explore how public and school libraries can partner with, better serve, curate accurate materials, and celebrate Indigenous peoples and cultures. The course was created in partnership with Mandi Harris, Cherokee Nation citizen, former Coeur d'Alene children's librarian, current doctoral student at the University of Washington, and recipient of the distinguished Spectrum Doctoral Fellowship "Catalysts for Change."

This free four-week course will utilize a blend of independent learning via the ICfL's Niche Academy platform and four live, online meetings for local presentations and discussion. The live webinars will be co-facilitated by Kristina Taylor and Mandi Harris. We have exciting plans for the webinars:

• Tuesday, October 10: Shoshone-Bannock author Dr. LaNada War Jack will talk about the Bannock War, the Sheepeater Campaign, and their impacts on federal Indian policy.

• Wednesday, October 18: Danielle Scott, University of Idaho Extension educator, will share how she customized the 4-H curriculum with a focus on Nez Perce knowledge. She will also touch on how to better communicate with Indigenous populations for better outcomes.

- Monday, October 23: Harry Slickpoo Jr. will share a brief nimipuutimt (Nez Perce) language lesson. He will talk about the return of the Wetxuuwiitin collection at the Nez Perce National Historical Park and his work to establish the new Hite'emenwees Research Library.
- Wednesday, November 1: Dr. Julie Poynsenby, staff member of the Coeur d'Alene Tribe's Department of Education, will present on their Summer Youth Internship and Voices to Hear programs.

The Indigenous Idaho course runs from Monday, October 2, to Wednesday, November 1. Registration is open until Friday, September 29. **This course is only offered once a year.** Space is limited to 30 Idaho library staff participants. Public, school, academic, and tribal school staff members are welcome. (Content will be applicable to all types of libraries/library staff. Some materials are K-12 focused.)

### Read to Me Rendezvous, November 14 – 15



The ICfL's biennial early learning forum will take place **Tuesday, November 14**, and **Wednesday, November 15**, in Boise. The focus is to provide support for **newer library staff** who have not had basic training in Every Child Ready to Read® and/or early learning programming.

# **Alert: The FAFSA is Changing!**

Starting with the 2024–25 award year, students and families will see a different measure of their ability to pay for college, and they'll experience a change in the methodology used to determine aid. There will be changes to the number of questions asked on the form, how the form is accessed, and the overall look and feel. If you have any instructions, handouts, etc. on the FAFSA form from prior years, we recommend discontinuing the use of those materials.

The ICfL is working on connecting libraries with training on how to help families access and fill out the FAFSA. In the meantime, you can check out this National College Attainment Network summary of upcoming changes.

#### **ARP ESSER Grants – Year 2**

The grant applications for Year 2 of the Out of School Time (OST) Planning and Programming grants are now open! You can find more information about both grants and a link to the application on our website:

- OST Programming Grant (up to \$3,000 to support your out-of-school programs for school-age kids and teens)
- OST Planning Grant (up to \$15,000 to support strategic efforts to serve youth in your community)
- The Summer Strategies Grant (up to \$20,000 to support strategic planning for summer programs) opens on September 20.
- The Summer Support Grant (up to \$2,000 to support your summer programs) and Summer School Libraries Grant (up to \$7,000 to keep your school library open during the Summer) both open on October 15.

# **Kindergarten Readiness Grant Application Extended to September 15**

If you were not able to apply for a Kindergarten Readiness grant by the original August deadline, you have a second chance! This extended application period should allow for more time to work with your community partners to develop projects to meet the goals of the K Ready grant and to reach more children through high-quality library programs and services.

### **Pilcrow Foundation Children's Book Grant for Rural Libraries**

The Pilcrow Foundation provides new, quality, hardcover children's books to rural public libraries across the United States. Its Children's Book Project grant offers a 2-to-1 match to rural public libraries: The library or its sponsors/partners contribute \$200 to \$400, and the Pilcrow Foundation matches with \$400 to \$800 for a total grant of \$600 to \$1,200 worth of new children's books. The application deadlines are April 1 and October 1 each year.

The Pilcrow Foundation provides a booklist from which Children's Book Project grant recipients can select books best suited for their community. The book list includes award-winning and star-reviewed titles from educational and literary organizations.

Few Idaho libraries receive this grant, and it may be because the match amount is difficult to secure by the grant deadline. We encourage you to plan ahead to apply for the October 1 round of grants.

# **Summer Library Programs Report Due September 15**

ICfL staff ask that all Idaho public libraries submit a very short report about their summer programs each year. This data and feedback allow ICfL staff to tell stakeholders and decisionmakers how summer library programs positively impact children, teens, families, adults, and communities. And because the program manuals and posters we provide to all Idaho public libraries are funded with Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) funds, we include this data in our report to the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) each fall.

### **Want Some FREE Professional Development?**

Did you know the ICfL will cover the cost of online continuing education courses or webinars through InfoPeople, Library Juice, and Amigos? It's true! If there's an online course or webinar from these providers you'd like to take, you can apply for access by completing the corresponding Course Access Request Form. To qualify for future CE funds for online learning, students must complete the follow-up survey and apply to access the course at least 15 days in advance.

### Equity and Early Literacy (Library Juice Academy), October 7 – November 3

Equity and Early Literacy will explore the development of racial awareness and young children – with a focus on implicit bias and other cognitive biases, ingroup/outgroup bias in babies and young children, and ways to foster belonging with our youngest learners through high-quality children's literature and equitable storytime practices. Participants will gain an understanding of the most current research and best practices to reduce bias in young learners and action-oriented ways to ensure equity is embedded in storytimes, literacy engagement, and family programming. This course is part of the Library Juice Academy Certificate in Early Childhood Literacy, but it can be taken as a stand-alone course.

Interactivity with children and their parents/caregivers and being purposeful in connecting storytime books and experiences will support early literacy behaviors. Assessment through self-reflection and peer sharing – along with hands-on practice developing and delivering early literacy tips to adults in storytimes – will provide you with the opportunity to energize your storytimes while becoming an advocate for early literacy in your library and community.


