TWEENS & TEENS

There is Still Time to Register for the Idaho Teen Reading Challenge!

The third year of the Idaho Teen Reading Challenge began on October 1, and your library can register for the challenge through October 20. To complete the challenge, tweens and teens choose eight titles from 10 categories to read from October through April. This year's categories are: Found While Browsing, Judge a Book by its Cover, One-Word Title, Read Before You Stream, Retelling of a Classic Sci. Fi/Fantagy True Stary YRCA Namines, Your Favorite Co.



Classic, Sci-Fi/Fantasy, True Story, YRCA Nominee, Your Favorite Genre, and Free Choice.

Here's how the program works:

- 1. The reading challenge runs from October 1 to April 30. Teens will be challenged to read one book from eight different categories (eight books total) during that time. This year we are providing 10 categories to choose from.
- 2. Register your library to participate in the program and request bookmarks, tracking forms, and reading journals.

3. After you receive program materials, you will give teens a form to keep track of their books. You can also hand out bookmarks and reading journals.

- 4. When a teen has completed the challenge, they can return their tracking sheet to your library. **New this year:** We will send you a custom vinyl sticker to hand out to teens when they finish the challenge. Also, each teen from your library to complete the challenge will earn you an entry into a drawing for free books for your library!
- 5. In May, the ICfL will send you a form to report the number of teens who completed the challenge at your library and to provide program feedback.

We will accept registrations through Friday, October 20.

Nourishing Minds Initiative

Is teen mental health something you are thinking about? Would you like to gain skills in building positive teen well-being? As a part of the *Nourishing Minds* initiative funded by the Institute of Museum and Library Services, the Seattle Public Library is seeking six U.S. public libraries to participate in a series of activities over the next year that will give library staff the opportunity to:

- Build strategies for proactively creating services in support of teen mental health.
- Move away from a crisis approach to teen mental health.
- Attend a series of participatory design training sessions and build skills in support of teen mental health.
- Receive coaching from Meridian Library District (Idaho) and Charles County Public Library (Maryland) staff.
- Facilitate a programming series and library space to support teen mental health.

Those selected to participate will receive a \$6,000 stipend to learn about and provide services in support of teen mental health.

Onboarding of selected library staff begins in November 2023, learning sessions begin in early 2024, and libraries selected will facilitate mental-health-centered programs from February through July 2024.

Check your displays! If you still have any of the obsolete materials shown below, you can order updated options through the ICfL's new online market. The support materials are available at no cost to Idaho libraries and nonprofits.

These "Great Books" bookmarks are outdated. While the books listed on them are still great, the better option is to hand out Bookworm bookmarks, which direct families to sign up for the ICfL's age-specific monthly newsletter with book suggestions, activities, early learning tips, and more.



If you still have Tumblebooks and DayByDayID bookmarks, please recycle them. These were part of a Library Services and Technology Act grant from many years ago and are no longer relevant.

Storytime Tip: Sensory Storytimes

From the Association for Library Service to Children (ALSC):

"Have a visual schedule. Visual schedules tell participants what to expect during storytime. This is especially important for children with developmental delays, who often find transitions difficult. Each element of your storytime should have its own easily identifiable graphic."

SCHOOL ZONE

The Need to Weed

Remember "Would You Rather," that game where players choose between two unappealing options? Let's play Would You Rather: Library Edition! Would you rather have shelves full of outdated material with inaccurate information, or only a few up-to-date, relevant titles?

Oh, if it were only a game. Many school librarians find themselves in this situation, especially when it comes to nonfiction and reference materials. But when we consider one of the most important functions of the school library – to support the curriculum with accurate and relevant information – it's clear that out-of-date titles should be removed from the shelf, even if that leaves the shelves looking bare. It is unfair to expect a student to complete high-quality classwork with low-quality resources.

There is no question that it is difficult and expensive to maintain a current reference collection, and only slightly less expensive to maintain a relevant nonfiction section. Every school in Idaho has access to encyclopedias and other reference materials at Lilischools.org, which can help defray the expense. There are also e-books and databases available to all Idahoans. For research, LiLI is a better resource for students than a Google search, and Lili for Schools is a more curated collection of resources that is suited to the research needs of most K-12 students.

Let's play another round of Would You Rather: Would you rather have students use old materials that contain outdated, incorrect information, or teach your students how to search always accurate, up-to-date databases? A far easier choice.

Read to Me Rendezvous, November 14 and 15, 2023: "Foundations and FUNdamentals"

The Rendezvous this year is focused on helping **new and novice library staff** establish an early learning foundation based on the cognitive, social, emotional, and physical development of children younger than age 6. ARP ESSER Grants – Year 2

Thanks to everyone who was able to attend the Year 2 American Rescue Plan (ARP) Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Grant Info Session. Here is a link to the recording, and here are the slides from the presentation.

The application for Year 2 of the Summer Strategies grant is now open. Applications for Year 2 of the Summer Support and Summer School Libraries grants open later this month!

• Summer Strategies Grant (up to \$20,000 to support strategic planning for summer programs) – The application is open now, with an October 25 deadline.

• The Summer Support Grant (up to \$2,000 to support your summer programs) – The application opens on October 15.

- Summer School Libraries Grant (up to \$7,000 to keep your school library open during the Summer) The application opens on October 15.
- OST Programming Grant (up to \$3,000 to support your out-of-school programs for school-age kids and teens) This grant application is now closed. Applicants will be notified of their award in mid-October.
- OST Planning Grant (up to \$15,000 to support strategic efforts to serve youth in your community)
 This grant application is now closed. Applicants will be notified of their award in mid-October.





Four Treasures of the Sky by Jenny Tinghui Zhang

Summary from Goodreads: "Daiyu never wanted to be like the tragic heroine for whom she was named, revered for her beauty and cursed with heartbreak. But when she is kidnapped and smuggled across an ocean from China to America, Daiyu must relinquish the home and future she imagined for herself. Over the years that follow, she is forced to keep reinventing herself to survive. From a calligraphy school to a San Francisco brothel to a shop tucked into the Idaho mountains, we follow Daiyu on a
