






Mend for the environment!

100 billion
garments are
produced each year

per year are released by fastfashion brands instead of the usual 2 seasons



Mending can defer or displace the purchase of new items, which is good for the environment.




Why is visible mending a good social activity?

- It's semi-structured
- It's low barrier-to-entry in terms of skills, money, interest level
- It's adaptable to different audiences and abilities
- It facilitates CONTINUOUS UNPLANNED (for patron) INTERACTION!
- People can share stories, teach skills, and otherwise connect.
- It's an easy win!



Case Study: Ethan Kjesbo's Dad's Shirt

- Ethan wanted to be able to wear his dad's shirt, but it was super raggedy in a few spots.
- In this instance, he really wanted to preserve the garment, because it has a lot of sentimental value.
- Solution: hand stitch a layer of sacrificial tee shirt underneath the raggedy parts
- Result: EXCELLENT!



Case Study: CLA Staff Retreat, Fall 2022

- Group(s): Community Library Association employees
- Time to set-up: 30 minutes on site, 2 hours prepping at home
- Time to complete: about an hour
- Time to clean-up: 15 minutes
- Mess level: moderate
- Difficulty level: low-medium
- Approximate cost: 40 staff-hours



Case Study: CLA Staff Retreat, Fall 2022

Supplies needed:

- Basic sewing supplies and notions
- Yarn
- Embroidery hoops
- textiles for patching
- embroidery thread, other embellishments
- Can-do attitude


Format:

- Nicole introduces activity (5 min)
- Break into groups by repair type (patching, darning, buttons) and gather supplies (10 min)
- Group leaders go over basic instructions (5 min)
- Employees repair items (20 min)
- Show and tell (5 min)
- Supplies left out for rest of day so people could mend during other sessions













Reflections

- Captive audience! It was a mandatory staff retreat.
- Breaking into groups was helpful, especially for people who were new to sewing
- People were bonding and sharing and goofing
- It's fun to have an abundance of supplies
- People seemed to like being trusted with my good scissors
- We do this at all staff retreats now!

- Accessibility: Have an alternate activity or role for anyone who might have hand dexterity limitations.
- It would have been nice to have more time for sharing.
- People were allowed to bring a different handcraft they liked if they wanted to do that instead of mending, it would have been nice to have sharing time for them.

Case Study: Earth Fest, Spring 2023

- Group(s): Environmentally minded townspeople
- Time to set-up: 1-2 hours
- Time to complete: 4 hours
- Time to clean-up: 1-2 hours
- Mess level: moderate
- Difficulty level: low-medium
- Approximate cost: free



Case Study: Earth Fest, Spring 2023

Supplies needed:

- Basic sewing supplies and notions
- Yarn
- Embroidery hoops
- textiles for patching
- embroidery thread, other embellishments
- Can-do attitude
- Multiple volunteers
- Information about mending
- Clothes with rips and stains

Format:

- Drop-in booth: Earth Fest attendees could drop by at their leisure.
- Volunteers circulated to assist people if they needed it, or people could just work on their own.
- People had to do their own mending!



Reflections

- High-traffic event was great for participation
- Having clothes on hand was helpful in drawing people in, in case they didn't bring anything
- Decoy Teen Marlowe made mending look cool
- Many different types of people participated! People formed new connections.

 There was a miscommunication, and the booth was advertised as a mending service, not DIY situation. This didn't create big problems, but we may have missed interested parties
